Mayl 2024 gardening column-

As I am writing this the trees buds are bursting, showing the delicate colours of young leaves, along with bulbs and early flowers; this is blossom season, starting well over a month ago. A whole tree covered with blossom is a wonder of nature, and is a national celebration in Japan with their "hanami" cherry blossom festivals. I walk through my garden every day (when it isn't pouring) under the opening buds and unfurling leaves and blooms. I have been in London for a week and am so glad I didn't miss any blossom back here. There are cherries and magnolias blossoming in London - which I seem to remember has so many trees throughout the city in streets and parks that it is classified as "forest" - how odd. Many of the

street cherries are Prunus Kanzan, which seems to me overstuffed with petals; I

prefer the more open, delicate *Prunus accolade or Prunus yedoensis,* the Yoshino cherry, or the simple shaped yellowish petals of *Prunus ukon.* Special weeping cherries in Japan are called "shidarezakura" and are especially prized. Japanese visitors were out in force gazing at the blossom in Greenwich Park. Back home all four of my magnolias are coming into flower, in spite of temperatures collapsing from 20 degrees to almost zero.

Some of my favourite text books on botany have turned up in art galleries. I came across an arresting definition of a tree by Hugh Ingram, where its structure is described as "evolution's response to life in a medium offering little buoyancy but much turbulence." The article was tracking plant life, initially from the sea, evolving through time to tree ferns, gymnosperms, and the first woody plants. Of course, trees are important; they are our shelter, shade, building material, fuel, food, and no less, objects of beauty because of all these things. Their life span is much longer than ours. Some of the shelter belt sycamores in our garden are one and a half times my age. Our oldest tree, a Scots Pine, was 152 years old when we had to fell it last year (too close to our neighbour's house). A 45

year old balsam poplar now our tallest tree is presently opening its beeswax scented sepals filling the air with perfume.

Plants differ right down to a cell structure that maximises surface area, to promote chemical - gas - air - exchange, and sun processing photosynthesis. The cell structure enables a growth pattern with a "stretchy" form quite different from our animal body cells. Their cells have a central vacuole allowing water to move in

and out, expanding the cells in response to the environment, season and weather. Buds swell, shoots and stems stretch, leaves spread wide. This is a modular

system of shoots, buds, leaves, and flowers that lets plants adapt to their situation. Their unique strangeness seems a bit more knowable.

Slaley Film Club

We feel that the existing format, combining an interesting film with an interval for supper and a good chat, works well and we hope that you will agree that it's great value!

The Parish Council: Grants, hedges and community engagement Grants

Twice a year (October and April), 'good causes' have the opportunity to apply to the Parish Council for small grants to assist them with initiatives that have the potential to benefit those within our community. This April two grant applications were approved by Councillors. The first to Slaley Leek Club, to help raise their profile and encourage more people in the Parish to take to their gardens and the second to Slaley Women's Institute, to support their purchase of a village notice board, for outside the shop.

Hedges

It had been a longstanding desire of the Parish Councils, acting on behalf of community members to improve visibility at the Townhead/B6303 junction by trimming the hedge at its southern corner. With the consent of the homeowner and thanks to volunteers in the village, excess flora was removed at the beginning of April, substantially improving sight lines.

Should you also be thinking of hedge trimming as we approach summer, be it in your garden or cutting back to help increase the width of our roads or pavements please remember to check for nesting birds first.

Community engagement

With the cooperation of the community shop, Parish Council 'drop in' mornings are to be trialled over the summer. Councillors hope this initiative will give community members more scope to share their thoughts or issues with them. The first session is being planned for late May. More details will appear in the shop and Slaley Notes in due course.

It's also approaching that time of year when the community can come together and air their thoughts at the Annual Parish Meeting. This year it will be held on 13th May at 18:30 in Slaley Commemoration Hall. If you have any points you would like to raise about community life do please come along.
